- Memory plays a central role in exam success at any level.
- At GCSE, we now have a knowledge-based curriculum.
- Year 10 Developing knowledge and understanding.
- Year 11 Developing knowledge, exam skills and memory.

Despite the introduction of the more challenging GCSE courses WBHS achieved outstanding GCSE results in 2019.

- •88% of students achieved the new 9 4 grades in English
- 88 % of students achieved the new 9 4 grade in Maths



- Over 84% of all grades in all subjects were 9 4
- Students of all abilities at WBHS made significantly better than expected progress

Successful English Students need to develop the following four skills

• To be a Critic





You need to be able to respond to texts that you read and evaluate the ideas and opinions in them as well as the methods the writer uses.



You need to be understand the craft of writing and creating texts. This means that you are aware of the language and structural features that writers use.

• To be a Curator



• To be Creative





You need to be able to create your own writing – stories, articles, essays, poems, plays, speeches. The three skills above will help you be creative

Combined Science (double award) 6 exams in total (1hr 15 each) Separate Sciences (triple) 6 exams in total (1hr 45 each)

Higher tier: 9/9 to 4/3	Higher Tier only: 9 – 4 in each Separate Science
Foundation tier: 5/5 to 1/1	
Choosing the right tier of entry is crucial.	
52% of Combined Science Students sat the Foundation paper in 2019	
Final decision is collaborative and is made after the trial exams in Feb.	
Year 11 students will sit an internal science exam (Higher or Foundation) in the final week of this half term to start the decision-making process.

What do the experts say?



A successful student:

- Has a clear goal
- Makes school work a priority
- Finds balance
- Takes responsibility for their learning
- Makes a revision plan
- Attends class
- Participates
- Talks to their teachers
- Uses family and friends for support
- Asks for help if needed

How can you practically help them?

- It doesn't matter if you don't know the subject or it's all changed since you were at school.
- You need to support them in their understanding.
- Share it out amongst partners, grandparents, older siblings if at all possible.
- Test them when they make revision cards etc.
- Let them teach you difficult concepts.
- Encourage posters around the house.
- Be around and take an interest.

BLAME THEIR BRAINS?, YES! NO!

Teenage years are critical time of growth for brain development explaining overlyemotional or risk taking behaviours.

More likely to respond from an emotional place, rather than a thinking place.

Stress hormone cortisol is produced more readily in teenage years – fight/flight response.



We know that the more you try to make your brain behave in the way you want to, the quicker it will – cognitive behavioural therapy.

A lot of what our teenagers are experiencing emotionally is 'normal'.

The importance of developing resilience in adolescence and beyond.
