# WHITLEY BAY HIGH SCHOOL COVID-19 RISK ASSESSMENT SEPTEMBER 2021



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#### Introduction

As the country moves to Step 4 of the roadmap, the government continues to take steps to manage the risk of serious illness from the spread of COVID-19. As COVID-19 becomes a virus that we learn to live with, it is imperative to reduce the disruption to students' education, particularly given that the direct clinical risks to young people are extremely low, and every adult has been offered a first vaccine and the opportunity for two doses by mid-September.

The Government accepts there cannot be a 'one-size-fits-all' approach. The system of controls provides a set of four principles to substantially reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19, whilst school leaders are required to make judgements about how to balance delivery of a broad and balanced curriculum for students, with the measures required to mitigate risk.

Our COVID-19 risk assessment has been considered and ratified by the Governing Body, consulted with trade unions and employees and shared with parents, students and visitors to the school. This ensures that the school has identified and accounted for the foreseeable risks, but also that expectations are clearly communicated to those to whom they apply, ensuring individuals are aware and understand why they have been put in place and the importance of adhering to them.

This risk assessment will be reviewed half termly unless circumstances require an earlier revision (e.g. a change in Government guidance, the need to add or adapt safety measures when observed in practice, or in the event of a local lockdown etc).

The Management of Health and Safety at Work Regulations 1999, place a duty on all employers to make a suitable and sufficient assessment of the risks to the health and safety of their employees, whilst they are at work, and to others who may be affected by the employer's undertakings.

## Implementing protective measures – Public Health advice to minimise COVID-19 risks

In education settings, preventing the spread of COVID-19 involves preventing:

- Direct transmission, for instance, when in close contact with those sneezing and coughing
- Indirect transmission, for instance, touching contaminated surfaces

Government guidance provides the following 'hierarchy of controls' to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Maximising use of these controls will create an inherently safer system, where the risk of transmission is substantially reduced. They are an adapted form of the system of protective measures that have been in place since March 2020 and have been reviewed in line with the most recent guidance for the new academic year beginning September 2021.

Control measures:

- 1. Ensure good hygiene for everyone.
- 2. Maintain appropriate cleaning regimes.
- 3. Keep occupied spaces well ventilated.
- 4. Follow public health advice on testing, self-isolation and managing confirmed cases of COVID-19.

As part of Step 4, which took place on 19 July 2021, 'bubbles' ended for all students under 18, social distancing was no longer necessary, and schools did not need to stagger start and finish times. The lifting of COVID-19 restrictions in schools is in line with the general removal of restrictions for England at Step 4.

From 16 August 2021, the legal requirement to self-isolate for contacts of a positive case ended for everyone aged under 18, and for adults who have been fully vaccinated. This means that from the autumn term, only those who test positive will need to self-isolate. From Step 4, NHS test and trace will carry out contact tracing in all education settings rather than being run by the school. Those identified as close contacts will be advised to take a PCR test, and only need to isolate if they test positive. Students must self-isolate if they have symptoms of COVID-19 or a positive test result.

The protective measures outlined in this risk assessment will remain in place for the autumn term including practicing good hygiene, ventilation, and regular testing until the end of September to strike a balance between relaxing restrictions and minimising further disruption to education. The school community should proceed with caution and find the right balance between protecting health and living with COVID-19 as more of the population is vaccinated. This places a high level of personal responsibility on staff, students and visitors to follow expectations in order to contain case rates and reduce transmission.

School will continue to maintain an outbreak management plan and will work with the local health protection teams regarding case numbers in school. The Local Director of Public Health may advise the school to temporarily reintroduce some control measures in the event of an outbreak.

All school trips, drama, music and sporting activities are able to resume in line with the relaxation of restrictions across society from Step 4.

In line with measures for wider society, the Government has recommended that face coverings are no longer necessary in any education setting.

All staff are supported to access both vaccine doses if they have not yet done so, helping further reduce any potential disruption as a result of self-isolation.

The Headteacher's decision would be carefully considered in light of all the circumstances and current public health advice. If a member of staff displays symptoms of COVID- 19 during a lesson, the teacher will inform the main office using the purple card email address. A member of SLT will be informed and will go directly

Students identified as clinically extremely vulnerable (shielding) or clinically vulnerable

Clinical studies have shown that children and young people, including those originally considered to be clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV), are at very low risk of serious illness if they catch COVID-19. The UK Clinical Review Panel has recommended that all children and young people under the age of 18 should no longer be considered CEV and should be removed from the Shielded Patient List, the national database of people considered clinically extremely vulnerable.

All children and young people should continue to follow the same guidance as everyone else, which can be found at <u>www.gov.uk/coronavirus</u>. For a very few individual children specific clinical advice may be given and this should continue to be followed. Where a student is unable to attend school because they are complying with clinical and/or public health advice, we will offer access to remote learning and their absence will not be penalised.

School will continue to monitor Government guidelines relating to clinically extremely vulnerable and clinically vulnerable groups and any changes to local measures.

If parents or students with particular conditions or significant risk factors are concerned, school will discuss this, explain the measures that are in place to reduce risks and ascertain whether anything additional can be done to support these areas further.

Travel and quarantine

All students travelling to England must adhere to government travel advice and parents should bear in mind the impact on their child's education which may result from any requirement to quarantine upon return. Those arriving from a 'red list' country, or have transited through one in the past 10 days, must quarantine in a government approved facility with a parent or legal guardian rather than at home.

Working safely during the COVID-19 pandemic

Whitley Bay High School is committed to taking all reasonable steps to manage risk and protect staff and others from transmission and infection of COVID-19.

The following control measures have been identified to protect those individuals with potentially increased vulnerability to infection or adverse outcomes from COVID-19. Where applicable they should be viewed as supplementary to the hierarchy of controls outlined in the previous sections of this risk assessment.

If staff are concerned, including those who were identified as clinically vulnerable, clinically extremely vulnerable or at increased comparative risk from coronavirus, we advise staff to discuss their particular circumstances with a member of SLT. This will allow an opportunity to review the measures that are in place to reduce risks and ascertain whether anything additional can be done to support these areas further.

Staff identified as clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV)

Whilst working from home arrangements for CEV staff has now ended, school continues to have a legal responsibility to protect their employees and others from risks to their health and safety. Staff who require such reasonable adjustments will be supported on a discretionary basis.

School will continue to monitor Government guidelines relating to clinically extremely vulnerable and clinically vulnerable groups and any changes to local measures. For example, it may be necessary to review working arrangements in response to reduced vaccine efficacy over time or to develop an immune response to a booster vaccination.

Staff identified as clinically vulnerable (CV)

CV staff can continue to attend school. While in school they must follow the system of controls to minimise the risks of transmission.

Living with a shielded or clinically vulnerable person

If a student or a member of staff lives with someone who is clinically extremely vulnerable or clinically vulnerable, including those who are pregnant, they can attend school. As with all staff, students and visitors, individuals are advised to follow the control measures within this risk assessment to minimise the risk of transmission.

## COVID-19 vaccination programme

Governors and school leaders encourage and support vaccine take up and will permit staff time (under the Leave of Absence Policy), including during term time, to attend booked vaccine appointments where it is not possible to arrange an appointment outside of working hours. This includes booster appointments that may be introduced in the Autumn term to extend or supplement vaccine efficacy.

The Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI) has recently announced that COVID-19 vaccines will be offered to all 16- and 17-year-olds from August 2021. Those in this group will be offered a first dose of the Pfizer/BioNTech vaccine with advice on when to offer the second dose to follow later. There is already an ongoing offer of vaccination to 17 year olds within 3 months of their 18th birthday. The JCVI is not currently advising routine vaccination of children outside of these groups, but will keep their advice under review.

Children aged 12 to 17 year olds with specific underlying health conditions that put them at risk of severe COVID-19 will be offered two doses of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine. Those 12 and over who live with an immunosuppressed person will also continue to be offered two doses of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine.
