Dear Parents and Students

As we approach February half term, I thought it timely to provide you with another update.

February Half-Term:

I know students have been working very hard on their on-line learning and I wanted to thank students for all their efforts during this period of remote learning.

Mrs Lawson and the Year 10 Pastoral Team have informed me that 494 'Well Done' postcards have been sent to students since January. Students are also enthusiastically getting involved in the weekly literacy challenges, as well as the whole year group challenges, which is great to see.
