A core of 16 girls attend a regular Monday meeting with the SI Tynemouth and Whitley Bay District. The group have been involved in a number of projects to raise awareness and money for various charities who have women and girls at their heart.

MANZINI YOUTH PROJECT

Trustees of the Manzini Youth Project provided tuition, materials and guidance for the 6th Form students to cut and prepare the several layers needed to stitch together to make re-usable sanitary protection for girls in Manzini, ensuring they can attend school during menstruation.

Manzini Youth Project trustee, Chris O'Neil, first came across the re-usable sanitary towel via a friend who had visited a refuge camp in Syria. Deconstructing a sample she created the pattern and added a waterproof layer cut from a shower curtain.Taking this idea to Manzini in Swaziland a sewing machine was bought and the volunteers made packs for each girl. A pack contains enough towels for 1 week plus 7 pairs of knickers and soap in a thick plastic bag, which is then used as a receptacle to wash the pad. Progressing with this education packs are also now given out so empowering the girls.

Chris and Margaret Parsons were so grateful for the time, effort and enthusiasm displayed by the girls from WBHS.

49 of our inspirational Year 9 boys took part in a head shave to raise money for the Teenage Cancer Trust to help their friend Olly.

We are so proud of all of them!



Rock4Olly is the collective effort of Rockcliff Rugby Club to support Olly Liddle in his brave fight against cancer. The Rugby Club have been raising money for Teenage Cancer Trust who are helping to care for Olly at the Great North Children's Hospital.

Olly was recently diagnosed with Osteosarcoma (Bone Cancer) in his right leg and has had an operation to remove his leg just above the knee. This should give Olly the best chance of being tumour free and allow him to get 90% mobility back with the aid of a prosthetic. What makes this more challenging for Olly is that he lost his mum to breast cancer when he was 7. Olly has already gone through more than many adults will ever do.

Rockcliff Rugby Club have hosted a number of charity events to raise money for the trust including a group of 49 of Olly's mates from Whitley Bay High School to shave their heads!!

'As soon as my head was shaved I could feel the cold and wind. The head shave took place at the Rugby Club. two barbers were brought in to do the shaving, along with Olly and his dad. It was really funny!' Leo Johnston

'Olly went to my first school. It felt really good to take part in the charity head shave to raise money for Olly. Olly aims to be walking with a prosthetic leg by Christmas and hopes to join WBHS in Yr 10.' Evan Bell-Daniels

'I know Olly through playing Rugby and also hanging out together outside of school. It felt really strange when they shaved my head, your brain tricks you and you think your hair is still there until you touch your head! Olly is very ambitious; now he can't play rugby he plans to be a sprinter. Rockliff Rugby Club have already raised money for a running blade for him.' Matthew Ratcliff
